Do Elephants Use Names?

Can you imagine an elephant calling its friend by name—just like you do? Since 1975, a scientist named Joyce Poole has studied African elephants. She noticed something curious: when one elephant called out, sometimes only one other elephant would answer. That made her wonder—could elephants be calling specific friends, using something like a name?

What's amazing is that elephants don't just copy each other's sounds (like parrots or dolphins). Instead, they seem to make up unique sounds, or names, for their friends—kind of like nicknames!

We still don't know exactly how elephants create or understand these names. But scientists believe this shows that elephants are very smart—and may be thinking in ways we're only beginning to understand.

One day, we might even learn to "talk" with elephants and understand how they see the world.
